



## Crosswalk of CalSCHLS Survey Items, 2021-22

This table is designed to facilitate comparison of the results from identical, similar, and related questions across the suite of student, staff, and parent surveys in the California School Climate, Health, and Learning Survey (CalSCHLS) System for the year 2021-22. It provides reference to report table numbers where results can be found and to the instrument item number, organized under the following main topics:

- Student Learning Environment
- Learning Engagement
- Learning Readiness / Student Well-being
- Developmental Supports and Opportunities at School
- Youth Development and Social-Emotional Learning
- Respect, Diversity, Cultural Sensitivity, and Equity
- Safety, Violence, Harassment, and Substance Use
- Discipline
- Physical Conditions of School
- Parental Involvement

For the California Healthy Kids Survey, only items from the Core high school module and the school climate module are included in the table. Questions on the staff and parent surveys are the same for all grade levels. Regarding item numbers, surveys are identified before the number using the following method: “C” for CHKS Core module, “SC” for the CHKS School Climate supplemental module, “S” for the staff survey, and “P” for the parent survey.
